A LEGACY OF LEADERSHIP

The Humphrey Fellowship Program was established in 1978 to honor the public service career of Hubert H. Humphrey (1911-1978). A long-time advocate of international cooperation and understanding, Humphrey served in public office for over three decades as the mayor of Minneapolis, Minnesota, as a U.S. Senator from the state of Minnesota, and as Vice President of the United States.

PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION

The Humphrey Program is a Fulbright exchange activity. Its primary funding is provided by the U.S. Congress through the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the U.S. Department of State. The Institute of International Education assists the U.S. Department of State in administering the Humphrey Fellowship Program.

LEADERS FOR A GLOBAL SOCIETY

The Hubert H. Humphrey Fellowship Program provides ten months of non-degree academic study and professional development in the United States. Humphrey Fellows are selected based on their potential for leadership and commitment to public service.

The Humphrey Program fosters a mutual exchange of knowledge and understanding about issues of common concern in the United States and other countries around the world. It offers valuable opportunities for education, leadership development, and interaction with American and international professional counterparts.

More than 4,400 men and women have been honored as Humphrey Fellows since the program was established in 1978. Approximately 200 fellowships are awarded annually.

OVERVIEW OF THE HUMPHREY FELLOWSHIP YEAR

Practical professional experiences are the core of the Humphrey Program. Fellows design and implement individualized programs to acquire career related knowledge, interact with colleagues, and gain professional experience. This is supplemented by university classes, field trips, special workshops, and seminars with other Humphrey Fellows. Although Humphrey Fellows are affiliated with a university, the fellowship is not an academic degree program.

UNIVERSITY PLACEMENT

Based on their professional interests, Humphrey Fellows are placed in groups at eighteen major university programs. These host universities are chosen for their excellence in particular fields of study and for the resources and support they offer Humphrey Fellows.

Each university has a Humphrey Program coordinator and advisors. These individuals provide administrative support as well as academic and professional advice.

Humphrey Fellowships are awarded competitively to mid-career professionals in many fields, among them:

- Agriculture and rural development
- Communications/journalism
- Substance abuse education, treatment, and prevention
- Economic development/finance and banking
- Education administration, planning, and policy
- HIV/AIDS policy and prevention
- Human resource management
- Law and human rights
- Natural resources, environmental policy, and climate change
- Public health policy and management
- Public policy analysis and public administration
- Teaching of English as a foreign language
- Technology policy and management
- Trafficking in persons policy and prevention
- Urban and regional planning

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- An undergraduate (first university) degree
- A minimum of five years full-time professional experience
- Limited or no prior experience in the United States
- Demonstrated leadership skills
- A record of public service in the community
- English language ability (up to 4 months of English training is available)

- Relevant courses, workshops, and seminars
- Accident/sickness health benefits policy
- A monthly maintenance stipend
- Supplies such as books and computersProfessional activities
